

# Talking and Listening



- Talking and listening should be an integral element in your child's development.
- The most important interaction a child can get from its parents is a good lengthy chat every day.

• To ensure your child's speech and language and talking and listening are being correctly stimulated, you should use 'Who?', 'What?', 'Why?', 'Where?', 'When?' questions.



# Phonological Awareness

- Your child has developed a wide vocabulary and everyday continues to do so.
- The phonics scheme we are using is called Read Write Inc. More information to follow.
- Please talk to your child about the new sound they learn each day.



# Early Reading



- One of the most valuable gifts you can give your child is the love of books.
- Every day, but especially at bedtime, parents should share a story/stories with their child.
- This special time will develop life-long skills for your child e.g. concentration, curiosity, general knowledge, prediction, recall, extensive vocabulary to name but a few.
- Time spent developing these at an early age will aid their academic experiences.
- After Halloween reading books will be sent home. Based on your child's readiness, some of these books will only have pictures whilst others will have words. This is linked back to your child's phonological awareness and their ability to recall sounds. Alongside the worded reading books will come a list of the words your child will meet during the course of the year. Use this list to revise word recognition with your child.


# Early Writing




- We are encouraging correct pencil grasp pincer grip.
- This will only be developed by continual practise and correction both at school and at home.
- In Year 1 at the moment some children are only able to mark make, some can over-write and some can copy underneath.
- Our aim is that every child will be able to copy underneath in preparation for independent writing.

# How to Hold a Pencil 1. Put your thumb and forefinger just above the cone shaped part of the pencil.

2. Let the pencil rest between your thumb and forefinger.3. Then put your middle finger underneath for support.



### Number



- Have you started to make your child aware of numbers? Did you draw their attention to the number on your front door, highlight the ages of family members, look for numbers when out in the car - on signs, registration plates, adverts etc, play board games with a numbered dice?
- Please count with your child. Sing traditional number rhymes, see who can count the highest, count backwards, clap count, count loud and soft etc.
- Please count amounts with your child. Ask them to set the table with 4 knives and 4 forks, to help you count out 6 apples in the supermarket, to choose 2 bedtime stories, to part with 3 of their sweets!
- Help your child understand mathematical language e.g. 'I am cutting the pizza in half', 'I have more carrots on my plate than you have on yours', 'We have to wait in the queue, we are second in line'.

- A referral to other multi disciplinary teams whose intervention may be of benefit to your child.
